John opened the bidding and my 3H response over the take-out double just showed 4-card support and less than a limit raise.

NS must have been playing strict take-out doubles of a major, otherwise North made a curious choice of bid over my 3H, as it would seem natural to bid the 7-card suit first, and then bid 4S if we continued on in hearts! Nonetheless it struck gold when South raised to game.

It looked like we had a small pick-up when John elected to sacrifice in 5HX over 4S, and only went for -500, with 12 tricks easy in 4S.

However, at the other table Mike felt he was not dealt a 7-card suit for nothing, and opened 3D as North, over which East bid an obvious 3H. Holding a few tricks and no diamonds, Betty could do nothing else sensible but double for penalties, and there it rested.

3HX lost the same 5 tricks but that was only +100 and 9 IMPs away.

On this board John's overcall of 3C was natural and weak (albeit a pretty good 'weak' hand), and NS took no further part in the auction. Privately, South was probably glad to be out of 1NT.

We use a 2D overcall of 1NT for single-suited hands, but if it is a minor suit, only use it for good hands, as the rebid must be at the 3-level anyway. So we may as well take advantage of the pre-emptive nature of the weak-jump overcall.

South made the rather odd lead of the ♥10, but the contract was never in jeopardy and we quickly wrote down +110,

At the other table Betty, sitting South, had almost the perfect hand (4-4-5-0 would be better) to bid 2C after the 1NT opening, intending to pass any response with at least a 4-3 or 5-2 known fit. The 2S response was more welcome, but pass was still her next call, and Mike made 9 tricks in 2S for +140 and 7 IMPs.

I picked up the ♠K, a void in hearts, 4 diamonds to the ten and 8 clubs to the ten. Therese Tully opened 1S on my right and I put in what I thought was a manly 3C (however I heard a lot bid 4C). Sue Lusk doubled (negative), Ray passed and Therese had no hesitation in bidding 4H which Sue converted back to 4S. Therese gave this a lot of thought before passing.

As Sue put dummy down she apologised and said she had two suits, but alas one of them is Kim's which caused lots of laughter and the hand deteriorated from there. Therese went 3 down and lost on the board but her team bounced back to beat us up 24/6.

Well done Townsville - the event will be held in Cairns next year at the Cairns International Hotel so start booking your flights and accommodation.

Klinger's Column

THIS hand is from the Australian Open Team Playoffs. With both sides vulnerable I was sitting West holding

♠ 752 ♥ 10743 ♦ A ♣ AKJ102

North opened 3D, my partner doubled and South passed. What should I bid?

The old yardstick for a takeout double of a three-opening was about one trick better than a minimum opening, so about 14+ points or a 6-loser hand or better. These days the requirements are lower, opening values or close to that, so about seven losers for a takeout double in the direct seat and about one trick worse (10+ points, 8 losers or fewer) in the pass-out seat.

There is no safety in doubling with the East cards, but those are the chances one takes. In response to a direct takeout double, one is expected to bid game with about 9-10 points or more. West clearly has enough to insist on game, but which one?

3NT is far-fetched with a singleton ace when you also have a 4-card major. You could bid 4D, showing the ability to play game in at least two places. The 4D bid often shows both majors with about equal length. The trouble with 4D is that if partner bids 4S are you prepared to stay there or will you run to 5C? As you can see, 5C always has three losers.

Even though the hearts are very weak, you should take the risk and bid 4H. It would be far too timid to bid only 3H. East would pass that.

The only interesting aspect was the bidding, since the play is routine. Take the ♠A, play the ♥K, win the spade return

and lead another trump). The defence can take one spade and two hearts. That is E-W +620 and +3 IMPs.

Open datum: E-W 510. At two tables the contract was 3D. Almost certainly it went 3D : Pass : Pass : Pass. Pass is acceptable by East, but not by West, who has a reasonable and safer takeout double in the pass out seat. You cannot always fear the worst. At the other four tables the contract was 4H, twice by West

and twice by East (where it probably went 3D : Pass : Pass : Double, Pass : 4H).

Women's datum: E-W 650. One North played 3D for +130. All the other tables played 4H, three times by West and twice by East. They all made eleven tricks because a spade was not led. On a diamond lead, West wins and plays trumps. After drawing trumps, East's spade loser vanishes on West's fifth club. ■

Teacher's Corner

The Hip Pocket Nerve Method of Learning Bridge

BRIDGE is not played a lot for money these days, most players being educated via duplicate, where it's not the end of the world to get a bad score. The usual pacifying comments when things go off the rails are that the other side could have made something anyway, that we were lucky not to be doubled, that it was sheer bad luck for the trumps to break badly, or some other benign excuse which masks the fact that we've made an error. There's not much accountability for a bad result.

Losing one's dollars, however, is a different story, as I found out recently.

For a whole week (crazy), I played in a high stakes game (Chicago scoring) in England, with and against some very good players. The system was old-fashioned Acol, all four-card majors and no frills in the bidding, Blackwood and Stayman being almost the only conventions. The exception to this was cue raises, which

seemed a little odd to me, considering the rest of the competitive bidding was basic with penalty doubles.

Running true to form as a bad card-holder (excuses, excuses), I was very pleasantly surprised to pick this hand up during one session:

The lead was the ♥A, and dummy went down with:

I was really excited and thought "whoopie - this is going to be worth plenty" (+1370 was going to convert to \$137.00), when I could count 12 tricks.

ALAS, those 12 tricks never materialised. Why? Because I made the careless, and fatal, error, of playing the trump suit too quickly, and not taking the safety play that was available. I cashed the ♦A first, and down I went, when trumps broke 4-0 (J10xx on my right). I needed to play the ♦Q first, so that I could pick up J10xx, by then leading up to the AK9 twice.

Instead of winning +1370, it was -100, when I had to concede a trump trick as well as the ♥A! What an idiot I felt! My partner, displaying charming English manners, said nothing, and the opponents mumbled, "Bad luck", but somehow I don't think they meant it.

That result would hurt a tiny bit as a bottom in a duplicate pairs event, and slightly more at teams, but *nothing* was like the pain of losing *money* for one's stupidity. I can almost guarantee that I will never again misplay a trump suit of AK9xx opposite Qxxx, when I need all the tricks!

I think we should all play more bridge for money. It will certainly improve declarer play, depending on how much is at stake! ■

Transfers after the 1NT opening bid have taken off since they were invented many years ago, but like most artificial systems, they can bite if not used properly.

South bid 2NT instead of 3C as a transfer to diamonds, and then she had nowhere to go. The 3D bid should have warned North that South was unbalanced (at least showing 5 clubs and 4 diamonds), but he pressed on to 3NT anyway.

I was East and led the obvious ♥10. We took the first 5 tricks and Therese, on lead, played a club. North won the ♠A and led the top 2 diamonds, finding bad news again.

The spade finesse now lost, and we had 8 tricks ourselves, with a 9th emerging from nowhere for +500 due to careless discarding by declarer. At the other table Lindy mis-guessed the trumps to go off in 5D, but still 9 IMPs to us. ■

Director's Corner

IS there any sport in which the referee awards a penalty and then wanders off to leave the players to fend for themselves? Possibly not and nor is it so for bridge. Law 84B: If the case is clearly covered by a Law that prescribes the rectification for the irregularity, he determines that rectification and ensures that it is implemented. Law 84C: If a Law gives a player a choice of rectification the Director explains the options and sees that the choice is made and implemented.

Some rectifications are complex. It is the director's responsibility to see that they are correctly applied and this means remaining close to the table until the auction or play is back to normal.

Any 2C response to a 1NT opening bid in an uncontested auction is now self-alerting. It is only a bid of 2C in this one specific situation 1NT (Pass) 2C that has become self alerting. Very rarely, a pair may play 2C as natural clubs. Such an agreement would be pre-alerted but remains self alerting at the time it is used.

There is no truth to the rumour that an artificial 1C opening does not require an alert. A bid of 1C that shows fewer than 3 clubs is artificial and must be alerted.

Having applied the standard rectification for an established revoke as per Law 64A or after ruling that there is no rectification as per Law 64B the director must adjust the score if damage to the non-offenders remains. While the need to apply Law 64C is not new, more score adjustments may be necessary now that the standard remedy has been reduced when the revoker does not himself win the revoke trick.

The Director (not the players) has the responsibility for rectifying irregularities and redressing damage. It is only the director who may waive rectification for cause, in his discretion, upon the

request of the non-offending side. Waiving rectification would not be for whim, or because a non-offender wanted to be kind. Usually the director would need to be satisfied that the non-offender contributed in some way to causing the irregularity.

Correct procedure is to call the director every time attention is drawn to an irregularity. Only the director may allow played cards to be retracted or calls to be withdrawn.

Directors don't appear to be having too many problems with the new Laws. A pity. I'd hoped for lots of new material for another ten years worth of articles. On the whole the greater clarity has made life easier although the infamous 27B1(b) is still a struggle. Having made an insufficient bid, a player should keep quiet about what he thought was going on. The director will take the offender away from the table if this information is required. Blurting it out to the whole table just makes life harder for partner. After 1C (4S) 2D a player should not tell the table, "I thought he bid 1S." After 1H (P) 1H a player should not say, "I thought I was opening," or "I thought partner opened 1D." The offender should sit quietly and let the director take control of the situation.

The following rule of thumb for assessing 27B1(b) replacement calls was put forward at the recent European Bridge League seminar for directors: Would all hands which might make the new call (the replacement bid) have also made the old call (the insufficient bid)?

This seems to be a very severe test. Others suggest that if there is just one hand that would support the new call but would not support the insufficient bid then the test fails. As yet, I have not permitted any 27B1(b) corrections and would be interested to hear from those who have. Directors are calling out for examples and it would be nice to gather some real life ones.

APPEALS

THIS is the first of a series of articles to explain the appeal process and to make procedures and ensuing decisions more thorough.

The Laws of Duplicate Bridge entitle players to seek reviews of decisions made by a Director. Procedures for conducting appeals may be found in QBA Regulations Section I. The QBA Tournament Committee has recommended the adoption of the WBF Code of Practice for Appeals.

This code sets out guidelines for hearings and decisions by appeal committees. Detailed summaries of topics, such as score adjustments, use of unauthorized information, logical alternatives and discrepancies between explanations given and related hands are provided.

The Code says: "The duty of a committee is to hear the statements of the Director and the players, to allow captains to speak thereafter, if they wish, and to explore with questions any aspects of the matter that a member wishes to clarify" and "the expectation is that the appeal committee will presume initially the decision of the Director is correct. The ruling is overturned only on the basis of evidence presented."

"In his discretion the chairman may ask to see the appeal form prior to the hearing". I think this means the chairman can look at basic issues rather than the appeal committee sitting around reaching some consensus before listening to the statements of the Director and players in the hearing.
